Gardenia Benros

Gardenia Benros is an award winning singer songwriter of international renown who was born in Praia, the capital of Cape Verde. Her paternal forbears were Sephardic Jews who had settled in Tangier, Morocco. They immigrated to Cape Verde when it was a Portuguese colony in the mid-19th century.

Gardenia inherited her musical talent from her mother and maternal grandmother. After spending most of her childhood in Lisbon, Portugal, she
traveled to the United States to study at the Berkley School of Music in
Boston. She became the first Cape Verdean singer to record with the multinational record company PolyGram and later became known as "A voz da
alma Caboverdiana," the soulful voice of Cape Verde, for her renditions of
traditional Cape Verdean melodies, especially morna and coladeira. In
addition to those musical genres, Gardenia sings funana, zouk, and funk. In
2013, Gardenia obtained a degree in music education from Hofstra University
in New York.

In June 2015, the Minister of Moroccan Diaspora and Migration invited Carol Castiel, president of the Cape Verde Jewish Heritage Project (CVJHP), to assemble a delegation of about 12 descendants of the Jews of Cape Verde to visit Morocco, the land of their ancestors. Gardenia was among the participants and thanks to this extraordinary opportunity, she became acquainted firsthand with her Moroccan Jewish roots. In Tangier, she visited the cemeteries and synagogues of that iconic city. During the trip Gardenia serenaded (a cappella) her fellow delegates and Moroccan hosts with Cape Verdean melodies. On the final night, she jammed with Moroccan musicians in the famous Ziryab restaurant in the medina of Rabat. The trip to Morocco has inspired her to create a unique fusion combining traditional Cape Verdean and Moroccan rhythms.

To date, Gardenia has recorded more than 16 CDs and has performed at concerts around the world including in her native Cape Verde, Portugal, Spain, France, the United States, Canada, Brazil and Holland.
